This is an article that appeared in the UK newspaper, "Sunday Pictorial" dated 28 August 1949...

"Bib and Nappie Plane is bringing 28 G.I. Babies Home to meet Grandma"

Over the dark Atlantic, a plane packed with happiness was winging its way eastwards to Britain last night on "Operation Bib and Diaper." Inside the four-engined airliner were forty-three British war brides with their twenty-eight children. And in this country, excited grandmothers waited for morning - and their first sight of baby.

The mothers, members of the Britannia Club of Oakland, California recently got together on a Big Idea...."Why not fly back home to see the old folk", they said, "and show the babies off to their grandmas?"

So at Oakland airport, 400 people watched as the giant plane, fitted with built-in bassinets for the babies, was loaded with as much tinned meat, cigarettes, sugar and sweets as the authorities would allow.

"We G.I. brides," said Mrs. Arrieta of Richmond (CA), "chartered the plane because we found it the cheapest way back to the old folk. We'll return to our husbands about October 7."

"All set?" called Chief Pilot Stachon after two stewardesses had shepherded the mothers and children aboard. The ex-G.I. husbands called goodbye, the plane started to move - and the first two babies started to cry.

Back in Britain, the grandmothers, notified by cable, got into action - by telephone and telegram to know from Northolt, Bovingdon, Blackbushe, Hendon, Croydon, and even the U.S.A.A.F. base at Burtonwood where exactly the airliner was to land.

The confusion was soon cleared up. The Grandma Special, after a flight via Hartford (CT), Gander (Newfoundland), and Shannon (Ireland) was due at..... (clipping is cut off at this point)

NOTE: This article was read by a Polish woman living in London, and sent to her son Zygmunt, who was living in Argentina....Their last names were also Stachon, the same as the pilot. Zygmunt sent a letter to Mr. Stachon c/o Transocean Airlines, New York, N.Y.....it was forwarded to Oakland Airport.....the letter reads.....

Dear Sir,

First of all I must give you an explanation for this letter. About two months ago you flew some babies and their mothers to England. There were various articles about the "Stork Plane" and so on in the newspapers. In one of them was mentioned the Pilot Stachon. My name is Stachon also, and being of curious disposition I wrote to London Airport for the address of the company to which the plane in question belongs. They duly informed me, and so I am writing to you.

I presume you are either Polish or of Polish descent, but am writing in English to be on the safe side. My father, Bolestaw Stachon was born in Mutopolsku or Galicia. By the way, he was an airman, too. I wonder if you, or your father, also came from that part of Poland, as there are not many Stachons in the world, we might be some kind of relatives. As for myself, as you see, I am in Argentina. I was born in Poland in '27 and left the country in 1940 to join the old man who was in the Polish Airforce in England. Hence, the letter in English. Recently, I came to Argentina.

I am giving you the address of the company's agency in Necochea, as I travel from one electric power station to another, to any wild outpost in the Republic, and so should I leave before receiving your reply, the letter shall be forwarded.

Talking about replies, please do me a favor and satisfy my curiosity by answering another thing, should you be expecting to fly down Argentina way, let me know. I can always shoot up to Bs Aires for a day and show you the town. It's quite a town when you know where to go.


Anyway, please write!



Along with the collection items currently held in storage we are trying to identify those objects that are currently on display. Do you recall donated or loaning items
